Activities:

Two activities summarizing some of the important topics from British, American and other English-Speaking-Countries Studies can be used as both introduction and revision exercises. They test the students' knowledge before and after the topics are studied deeply.

I. REALIA BOARD GAME

THREE-MINUTE TALKS.

The game is for a pair of students. Each pair needs a board, a coin and two counters.

Instructions for the students:

Play with a partner, move in different directions. Toss a coin, heads = move one field, tails = two fields. Speak about the topics for three minutes. Try to give as many facts as possible. On the way back, only add any other information which has not been mentioned by your partner. The first player to reach the finish is the winner.

II. SENTENCE GAMBLE

Students work in pairs, each pair gets a sheet of paper with sentences. Some of them are correct, some are wrong. At the beginning students have £100 and they use the money to bet on sentences, which they think are correct. The teacher reads one sentence after another, has students to decide and write their bet, then the teacher closes the bets and says if the sentence is correct or not. Students either add their win or subtract. Repeat the situation with another sentence etc. The minimum bet is The winner is who wins most money.


Follow-up activity: Class discussion about the facts in sentences, revision of particular topics. **Instructions for the students**:
